Return to On-site Schooling - Term 4

On behalf of our school, I want to say a big thank you to all our students, parents and carers for your continued resilience and support during Term 3. I know remote and flexible learning has not always been easy, but through our collective efforts, our students have continued to make valuable progress in their learning. You can be confident that our school will support any student who has fallen behind to catch up.

Term 4 is important for every Victorian student, and our teachers will strive to deliver high-quality learning for everyone. Whether we're teaching remotely or face-to-face, our focus for Term 4 is on making sure that every student is supported in their wellbeing, learning and transition needs.

The Victorian Government has outlined the staged return to on-site schooling as part of its gradual roadmap towards reopening.

TERM 4 ON-SITE SCHOOLING ARRANGEMENTS FOR STUDENTS

Subject to the advice of the Victorian Chief Health Officer, the Victorian Government has released a staged approach for students to return to on-site schooling. The purpose of the plan is to get students back in the classroom as soon and as safely as possible without putting at risk all that has been achieved through the period of restrictions to reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19).

To achieve both these aims, the return to onsite learning needs to be staged, just as the easing of all other restrictions is staged. In metropolitan Melbourne, health authorities need to monitor the impact of students and parents beginning to move across the city again before schools move to a full return. Having one million students return to school all at once could compromise the ability to monitor this impact.

For our school, the following arrangements apply:

5–9 October (first week of Term 4)

- remote and flexible learning will continue for all students
- on-site supervision for children of permitted workers and vulnerable students will continue to be provided, consistent with existing guidelines.

From 12 October (second week of Term 4)

- students in Foundation to Year 2 will return to full-time on-site schooling. The existing remote learning program will not continue for these year levels
- remote and flexible learning will continue for all students in Grade 3 to Grade 6
- on-site supervision will remain available for students in Grade 3 to Grade 6 who are the children of permitted workers and vulnerable students.

This will continue until a date is set for the return of all students to on-site learning, based on health advice.

In line with the Operations Guide, students will have a staggered start and finish to the school day.

- **Foundation** enter through Greenwood gate between 9:00 9:10am. Please ensure students are at school no later than 9:10am. Pick up will be at Greenwood gate from 3.30 to 3.40pm.
- **Year 1** enter through Herbert Street gate between 8:40 8:50am. Please ensure students are at school no later than 8:50am. Pick up will be at Herbert Street gate from 3.10 to 3.20pm.
- Year 2 enter through Commercial Road (bike shed) gate between from 8:50 9:00am. Please ensure students are at school no later than 9:00am. Pick up will be at Commercial Road (bike shed) gate from 3.20 to 3.30pm.

Visitors to school grounds is limited to those delivering or supporting essential school services. Parents will need to drop off and pick up their child at the appropriate gate, therefore it is important that you prepare your child for saying goodbye at the school gate.

Outside school hours care and vacation care

During the staged return, outside school hours care will be available to students attending for on-site supervision and progressively for the relevant year levels returning to on-site schooling. Vacation care may operate during the school holidays but only for students who are eligible for on-site supervision at school in Term 3.

Health and safety measures

The Term 3 remote and flexible learning arrangements were put in place to significantly reduce the movement of more than one million students and their families across Victoria, to help slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). Thanks to you and your family for contributing to this on behalf of our school community.

As on-site schooling resumes, we will continue to have in place strong measures to protect the health and safety of students, staff, families and the community. As per the Department of Education Operations Guide, this includes staggering start and finish times, designated recess and lunch play times and areas, restricting parent access to school grounds and continued emphasis on hand hygiene and physical distancing where possible.

Whether your child is, or children are, returning to face-to-face learning or will be continuing with remote and flexible learning, please be assured we will be focused on three key priorities in Term 4:

Mental health and wellbeing

• Our highest priority will be the wellbeing, particularly the mental health, of every student and member of staff. This means effectively mobilising all available resources to support our most vulnerable students and enabling staff to access the relevant support services.

Learning and excellence

• Some of our students have thrived in the remote and flexible learning environment, others have maintained their learning progress, and some have fallen behind, despite their best efforts and those of their families and teachers. Our priority will be supporting both those who need it to catch up and those who have progressed to continue to extend their learning.

Transitions

• We will make every effort to ensure successful transitions for children moving from kindergarten into Foundation, Year 6 moving into Year 7 and students moving up any year level in between.

We know some families are worried that their child may have to repeat a year due to the disruptions of coronavirus (COVID-19). There is little evidence to support the benefits of repeating a year to catch up. Instead, schools will use teaching strategies that draw on the best evidence available to help students meet their learning needs. Parents, families and carers can be confident that the best option for almost every child is to stay with their peer group.

Our school, working with you, has shown it can be flexible and adaptable in responding to the challenges of coronavirus (COVID-19) and will continue to meet student needs as we look towards the end of the 2020 school year and ahead to 2021.

Temperature Checks

Students will be temperature checked with an infra-red thermometer before they enter their classroom. As per the current health guidelines, students with a temperature over 37.5°C will not be able to attend school, and a parent or carer will be asked to collect them straight away. Please prepare your child for temperature checks, and feel free to make use of the social story about having your temperature checked on the school website, under the Wellbeing tab.

CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) CHILD TEMPERATURE SCREENING

Your child will have their temperature checked as they enter their classroom.


News from our Specialist team

Did you know?

The world's largest cave is located in Vietnam!

First discovered in 1991 by a local farmer Ho Khanh, he teamed up with scientists and explorers to rediscover the cave in 2009. Hang (cave) Son Đoòng is over 5km in length and due to holes in the ceiling of the cave, light can enter enabling plants and vegetation to grow inside. Only 1000 people are allowed to enter the cave every year. Our Foundation to Year 2 students were invited to go on a virtual tour of Hang Sơn Đoòng. Students shared their highlights of the tour and wonderings about the cave. The year two students also connected their learning with Vietnamese titles and location and position words. Students are to be commended for continuing to learn Vietnamese remotely during Term 3.




